

ANESTHESIA EDUCATION

Report from Dr. Mark Levine

VICE CHAIR, EDUCATION

The Department of Anesthesia at the University of Toronto is the largest in Canada and provides educational experiences for a wide variety of learners. Over 300 faculty members in 14 affiliated and community sites are enthusiastically involved in educating the full range of learners including approximately 100 full time anesthesia, pain medicine and family practice anesthesia residents, many elective residents, over 100 fellows, undergraduate students, graduate students, allied health professionals and anesthesiologist in practice who participate in Continuing Education and Faculty Development programs.





their fields including the areas of educational research and innovation. In the past few years this has been most evident, but not limited to, the residency program. The recent adoption of Competence Based Medical Education, based on the Royal College initiative, Competence by Design, is an excellent example of the dedication, expertise and innovation demonstrated by educators within the department. Within the last 2 years, the Postgraduate Program Director and a large cohort of experts have redesigned the curriculum, introduced new teaching methods, developed unique evaluation tools, and produced an impressive system designed to collate the huge volume of evaluation data now being collected for each resident.

None of these successes would be possible without the support of our dedicated, talented faculty members and the outstanding administrative and technical support provided by our central office and all the affiliated departments. These successes will be further highlighted in the reports from each of the Program Directors.

I would like to thank and congratulate all who have contributed to these outstanding achievements over the past years.

UNDERGRADUATE EDUCATION PROGRAM

Report from Dr. Ahtsham Niazi

DIRECTOR, UNDERGRADUATE EDUCATION PROGRAM

In the 2016-2017 academic year, the Undergraduate program continued to grow and develop its program by strengthening our e-learning tools and our relationship with our community partners.

Our anesthesia course manual was launched as an iBook, allowing students to access it on their iPads, iPhones and laptops. Students have found the iBook to be very user friendly as they can bookmark important pages, take notes on it and access it from anywhere, on any device, and at any time. A PDF version is still available for students who do not have an iOS device and allows students to print important chapters for their personal use.



The Acute Pain Module, which was developed by Drs. Diana Tamir and Clyde Matava, was also introduced this year. This replaced the last remaining teaching seminar that was being taught to medical students. The anesthesia undergraduate program now has seven e-modules on the following topics: pre-operative assessment, airway, regional anesthesia, obstetric anesthesia, acute pain management and two simulation modules. We are in the process of creating one more e-module on Fluid Management which is being developed by Drs. Beverly Morningstar and Clyde Matava; and we hope to have this ready in preparation for the next academic year.

Due to logistic reasons, our community partners have been unable to attend our monthly Undergraduate Education (UGME) Committee Meetings. The Committee highly values the input our community sites have to offer and strongly felt their lack of presence. To make our meetings more inclusive, we began using a video conferencing platform, Zoom, which enables our community partners to join our meetings remotely without coming downtown. Instructions have been provided to all community sites and community site coordinators are actively joining our meetings through their smartphones, thus greatly improving our community attendance. In addition to this, UGME committee has nominated Dr. Patrick Mark, Undergraduate Site Lead at Michael Garron Hospital, as the committee's community lead. In his role as Community Lead, Dr. Mark brings forward a community report at our monthly UGME meetings, which highlights issues experienced by community sites. These issues are addressed by the Director, the Vice Chair of Education and the entire UGME committee.

With the introduction of the iBook, we received feedback from our student representatives on the UGME committee, which we hope to incorporate in the next edition of the iBook. Students requested the manual to be more concise and short, as it is quite lengthy. The UGME committee also noted that some of the content was not up to date. In light of this feedback, we have approached old and new authors of our iBook, and requested their assistance in revising and updating their chapters. The content of the 2nd Edition of the iBook will be reviewed by expert faculty within the University of Toronto, and be more concise and up-to-date. We plan to release the 2nd Edition of the iBook in 2017-2018.

The Longitudinal Integrated Curriculum (LInC) is now in its third year. Since the successful launch of the LInC program last year, it has expanded in numbers this year. The LInC anesthesia program now includes twenty seven students who are distributed across six sites as follows: Sunnybrook Health Sciences Center

(4 Students), North York General Hospital (4 Students), Michael Garron Hospital (3 Students), Toronto Western Hospital (4 Students), Mount Sinai Hospital (4 Students) and St. Michael's Hospital (8 students). Students complete the equivalent of nine clinical days in anesthesia, longitudinally over the year with the same preceptor. This longitudinal experience allows the preceptors to see progression of the student's skills and knowledge over the year. Like the core clinical students, the LInC students also attend two simulation days, one at the beginning of their rotation and one near the end. The performance of the students in the Longitudinal Integrated Curriculum program has been equivalent to the students in the anesthesia core rotation, both in their written exam performance and their clinical evaluations.

Changes in roles and responsibilities include Dr. Maisie Tsang taking over from Dr. Clyde Matava as our new Electives Lead, Dr. Lindsay Taam taking over from Dr. Darryl Irwin as our new undergraduate site coordinator for North York General Hospital, Dr. Eric You Ten taking over from Dr. Mital Joshi as our new undergraduate site coordinator for Mount Sinai Hospital and Dr. Patrick Mark as our new Community Site Lead.

In 2015-2016, we sought ways to reward our teaching faculty. We proposed that all University of Toronto affiliated hospitals establish an undergraduate award to reward their outstanding teachers. Most of our hospitals already had an award in place however we hope all hospitals will participate in this program soon. We are happy to announce that Sunnybrook Health Sciences Center was one of the first hospitals to take this initiative and implement an undergraduate teaching award. We are delighted that Dr. Anita Sarmah was the first recipient of this award.

We would like to congratulate Drs. Justin Oh and Madelaine Kukko, who were the recipients of the 2016 and 2017 Dr. Evelyn Bateman Award, for their outstanding contribution to anesthesia as medical students. To recognize their excellence in undergraduate teaching, we would like to congratulate Drs. Natalie Clavel and Dragan Djordjevic, the recipients of the 2016 and 2017 Dr. John Desmond Award.

Within the new Foundations Curriculum, our anesthesia faculty continues to participate as tutors for Case Based Learning in the Toronto Patient-Centered Integrated Curriculum (TOPIC). Our faculty is also involved in the Integrated Clinical Experience (ICE) which is a continuation of the Art and Science of Clinical Medicine (ASCM) course. Our faculty is actively involved as Academy Scholars with the Portfolio Program, and as evaluators in the iOSCE assessment of medical students.

A huge reason behind the success of the Department of Anesthesia's Undergraduate Program are the Undergraduate Medical Education Committee members. These are a group of highly dedicated teachers who strive to improve the teaching and anesthesia experience for all medical students. This year I would like to thank them for all their support and help in making this program successful and nationally renowned.

Challenges for the upcoming academic year include the release of the 2nd Edition of the iBook and the final e-module on Fluid Management. In addition, we hope to add to our electronic teaching material by replacing our daily evaluation cards with online evaluations. In preparation for next year, we will replace our current yellow daily evaluation cards with online daily evaluations on MedSIS. These evaluations can be completed by preceptors online, and will enable the anesthesia rotation to become completely paperless.




Figure 2. Worldwide download of the Anesthesia Manual iBook (Within 8 weeks of launching)

POSTGRADUATE EDUCATION PROGRAMS

Report from Dr. Lisa Bahrey

DIRECTOR, POSTGRADUATE EDUCATION PROGRAM

The Residency Program at the University of Toronto remains the largest in Canada with 103 residents. Our program continues to be very popular amongst applicants from Canadian Medical Schools as well as International Medical Graduates. We continue to fill all positions in the first iteration of the CaRMS Match with our highest ranking applicants. This year we welcomed 21 new PGY1 trainees including 4 International Medical Graduates, 2 sponsored trainees and 1 successful transfer trainee from another program. The incoming residents were welcomed with a PGY1 Orientation e-Handbook. This new initiative links incoming residents to key information and resources from the time of the CaRMS Match, including current trainees who serve as near-peer mentors and help navigate the transition to residency.



Research and scholarship are prominent components of our training program. Many of our residents are involved in research, scholarship and advanced degree programs. We currently have 16 residents involved in significant research projects concurrent with their residency training this year and 43 publications as a result. The Clinician Investigator Program has been designed to educate residents in science and medicine so that they are well prepared to embark on careers as clinician scientists. In 2015-2016 we had 7 residents enrolled in this stream, including Drs Gianni Lorello, Neil Goldenberg, Ben Steinberg, Justyna Bartoszko, Joshua Bell, Ashwin Sankar, and Lavarnan Sivanathan.

Significant scholarship continues within the program this year. Six residents are currently enrolled in advanced degrees: Dr. Asad Siddiqui is enrolled in a Master in Education and CACE (Centre for Ambulatory Care Education) a Wilson Centre Associated Fellowship through Women's College Hospital. Drs. Clivatti and Bartoszko are both enrolled in a Master in Education, Dr. Sivanathan in a Master in Clinical Epidemiology, Dr. Law in a Master in Health Policy, and Dr. Eric Siu in a Master of Business Administration. We have several residents actively involved in scholarship and education, including several who have completed learning modules, developed cognitive learning aids, designed and implemented handover tools, and written book chapters.

Our residents were also very successful in acquiring very competitive awards and Honours: Dr. Ben Steinberg was the recipient of the 2015 CSCI/CIHR Resident Research Award. Dr. Ashwin Sankar, Dr. Joshua Bell and Dr. Lavarnan Sivanathan were all recipients of a Dr. Allan K. Laws Clinician Scientist Fellowship Award. Dr. Joshua Bell also received: The Joseph M. West Family Memorial Fund, the William Cron & Jean Harris Memorial Fellowship, and the Starr Medal Awards. Dr. Michael Sklar received the Joseph M. West Family Memorial Fund Award. Dr. Pablo Perez d'Empaire received the 2016 Postgraduate Medical Trainee Leadership Award and was inducted as a Fellow of the American College of Critical Care Medicine.

Many of our residents presented research findings at the 37th Annual Shields Day. Dr. Michael Sklar was the recipient of the Hynek Rothbart Award for Best Resident Oral Presentation and Dr David Levin was presented the David Bevan Award for Best Overall Poster Presentation. The Thomas Donald Hammell Award, for the resident who is identified by his/her peers as the person who has made the greatest

contribution to the program was presented to Dr. Chris Farlinger. The Alan Laws Travel Fellowship Awards were presented to Dr. Pablo Perez d'Empaire and Dr. Asad Siddiqui. Dr. Asad Siddiqui and Dr. Eric Siu each received Resident and Fellows Tuition Awards.

The Program has seen many new initiatives this year. There is now a formal, longitudinal POCUS curriculum which includes a PGY2 and PGY3 hands-on "bootcap", clinical rotations and academic teaching sessions throughout the year. We are the only program in Canada to have a formal POCUS curriculum. Several new evaluation tools and learning modules have been developed and introduced to support residents in the intrinsic CanMEDs roles. A Resident Wellness Committee has now been formed with Dr Fahad Alam as Resident Wellness Lead. The committee is working to develop a formalized wellness curriculum, in alignment with the ACUDA vision. Dr Sheldon Lyn is now the Community Anesthesia Faculty Liaison and serves to aid residents in organizing educational opportunities at community hospitals. The end of the year saw the introduction of the first annual Voice of the Resident (VOTeR) Survey. This was introduced as a form of annual program feedback and quality improvement initiative.

In the spring of 2016, all fifteen final year residents were successful at the Royal College Examinations and many have remained on as fellows or faculty members at our teaching sites. A reception was held at the Faculty Club to celebrate the successful completion of residency. This event was attended by the graduating anesthesiologists, family members and a number of faculty. Dr. Peter Pisters, President and CEO of University Health Network, was the keynote speaker at this event.

As the Program moves forward and looks ahead to 2017, there will be continued focus on Program Development as we plan to implement The Royal College's competency based medical education initiative: Competency By Design. Our Program's strategic planning is well underway. A large Needs Assessment for Curriculum Re-Design has been done with our Program's key stakeholders and we have been collaborating with both the Royal College and Postgraduate Medical Education at The University of Toronto to make our exceptional program even better.

PAIN MEDICINE RESIDENCY PROGRAM

Report from Dr. John Hanlon

DIRECTOR, PAIN MEDICINE RESIDENCY PROGRAM

It has been an exciting and busy year for the Pain Medicine sub-specialty residency. July 2016 will mark our official residency start date when we welcome two FRCPC trained physicians into our program and much of our work over the last 12 months has been to prepare for their entry.

Both incoming trainees are Toronto graduates who have demonstrated a longstanding commitment to practicing comprehensive pain medicine. Dr. Ehtesham Baig recently obtained his FRCPC certification in Anesthesiology and Dr. Najam Mian recently obtained his FRCPC certification in Physiatry. Over the next two years, the residency will provide them with intensive multidisciplinary training necessary to become experts in the prevention, diagnosis, treatment and rehabilitation of the spectrum of acute pain, cancer pain and non-cancer pain problems.



As with any multi-specialty residency, there will be significant variation in the baseline knowledge and skills of the trainees entering the Pain Medicine residency. In order to support our diverse learners, we developed and will host the inaugural U of T "Pain Medicine Ground School", an intensive two-day course with didactic sessions, case based learning and hands-on physical exam teaching. In an effort to build overall capacity in pain medicine, we also invited all chronic pain fellows from across the U of T hospital to attend

The University of Toronto Pain Medicine residency program is well positioned to become the national leader in pain medicine education. We have also reached agreement with other participating Universities to deliver quarterly national webconference learning events focusing the non-medical expert roles as a collaborative effort between all active programs. As shown in the accompanying screenshot of Pain Medicine residents across the country, we are planning on using webconference platforms allows us to connect trainees from coast-to-coast and leverage resources to overcome many of the challenges inherent to new and small residency programs.

In Toronto we are fortunate to have many national and international leaders in Pain Medicine. Together we have developed an unparalleled comprehensive didactic curriculum. In the spirit of building national and international capacity, our Pain Medicine residents plan to invite all Toronto Pain fellows to attend the didactic teaching curriculum in person and via webconference. We believe this inclusive approach improves the learning experience for our Pain Medicine residents and is more rewarding for the instructors. It also supports important networking that we believe will translate into an ongoing community of practice for the participants.

Chronic Pain affects over 15% of Canadians. As of July 2016 there will be seven Pain Medicine residency spots across the country, which is woefully inadequate to meet our societal need. We continue our efforts lobbying the Post Graduate Medical Education office, the respective provincial ministries and the RCPSC. Our goal is to increase training spots to build capacity and reach the critical mass of well-rounded pain physicians capable of leading the medical community's response to inadequately treated chronic pain and an ongoing opioid crisis.

Like other fledgling residency programs, Pain Medicine initially existed outside of the Canadian Residency Matching System (CaRMS), but for our upcoming application cycle we were able to successfully lobby the National Committee of Post Graduate Deans to allow Pain Medicine into the CaRMS program. This will allow for a smooth and transparent application cycle that will be completed in November 2016.

The backbone of every successful residency training program is the administrative support. We thank Jennifer Morris for her ongoing hard work and experience in supporting the training program and our learners. We are also very fortunate to have a truly multidisciplinary Residency Program Committee (RPC) full of passionate leaders within their own specialties. This committee will oversee all aspects of the pain medicine residency with

representation from nine Departments and Programs within the Faculty of Medicine. Together, with our teaching faculty, these dedicated clinicians will be our greatest resource. We thank them all for their ongoing time and dedication as we prepare to train the future Pain Medicine leaders of Canada.

FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM

Report from Dr. Doreen Yee

DIRECTOR, FELLOWSHIP PROGRAMS

Fellowship positions across the six fully affiliated teaching hospitals continue to be very popular among both Canadian and international trainees. The subspecialty positions tend to fill up first, although the Advanced Clinical Practice positions are ideal for some who wish to consolidate their practice skills after finishing their residency. Some places are accepting people 2 years in advance.

Although not all fellowships have a research component, most fellows have an opportunity to do some kind of research work with a mentor. Productivity ranges from book chapters, articles in peer-reviewed journals, to presentations at meetings. This was evidenced by the fact that more than half of the oral presentations and over 40% of the abstract presentations at Shields Day were presented by fellows. Dr.



Giulia Marie Ruggeri won the Dr. R J Byrick Award for the Best Fellow's Research paper presentation at the 38th Annual Shields Research Day. A number of these went on to be presented at the annual CAS meeting the following month, as well as at other national and international meetings. Drs. Papu Nath and Ushma Shah won the best paper awards for the Ambulatory Anesthesia and Pediatrics categories at the CAS meeting in Vancouver in June 2016. The following year Dr. Elyana Wohl won the best Neuroanesthesia paper in Niagara Falls.

There are also numerous opportunities for educational activities. Fellows were once again involved in Undergraduate teaching as workshop station leaders at the now annual Anesthesia Interest Group (AIG) evening organized by Dr. Diana Tamir. The stations included teaching demonstration of airway skills, ultrasound visualization of nerves and vessels, and neuraxial techniques, to name a few. It was an exciting opportunity for teaching and interaction between fellows, residents and medical students. For those interested in simulation in education, there was ample opportunity to run simulation sessions for both resident and medical student teaching. A handful of fellows pursue concurrent Master's programs in Education, Global Health, or other related areas. There was even one fellow with a multiyear CIHR fellowship grant doing a PhD in Clinical Epidemiology.

The "fellowship experience" extends beyond the subspecialty work for many. It is a time for most to transition to a consultant anesthesiologist with graduated professional independence, surrounded by peers, role models and mentors. Life-long friendships are initiated between people "placed in a common situation". A few fellows wrote articles about their year, and both concluded that it was an extremely worthwhile experience, particularly in hindsight!

The Professor's Rounds for fellows continue to be a success, and draws out 20-40 fellows monthly. Our faculty experts gave nine talks across a wide variety of topics over the academic year.

DIRECTOR, FAMILY PRACTICE ANESTHESIA PROGRAMS

Curriculum

The curriculum for the FPA Residents remains the same, with the FPA Residents rotating through:

- Toronto East General Hospital
- Mount Sinai Hospital
- The Hospital for Sick Children
- North York General Hospital ICU
- Port Perry Hospital or Orangeville Hospital (rural Anesthesia)



Intensive Care Unit (ICU) Rotation:

The ICU rotation was re-introduced to the FPA Residency Program (4-weeks) in the 2014/2015 academic year in order to have the FPA Residents get dedicated clinical time and teaching with regards to managing critically ill patients. The FPA residents are now rotating through North York General Hospital (NYGH) ICU for their 4-week block. The ICU rotation has been warmly received by the FPA Residents. The FPA Residents are exposed to various critically ill patients during the ICU rotation. This experience has been very useful for their future clinical practice since many of their Emergency Medicine Room Physician colleagues often consult Family Practice Anesthetists for their expertise in managing the airway, inserting invasive lines and stabilizing critically ill patients that arrive in rural/smaller hospital Emergency Rooms.

Orangeville Hospital:

Orangeville Hospital has been added as a second rural site for the FPA Residency Program starting this academic year in order to provide an alternate site for rural Anesthesia. Dr. Rickesh Sood, FPA (and previous graduate of the University of Toronto FPA Residency Program) will be the Resident Coordinator, in charge of their education and clinical experience at Orangeville Hospital.

All of the FPA residents successfully completed their FPA Residency training and all of them are currently working in smaller/rural hospitals providing Anesthesia for their communities, such as Simcoe ON, Arnprior ON, Port Perry ON, Hanover ON

Internal Review

The FPA Residency Program underwent an Internal Review conducted by the Department of Family and Community Medicine (DFCM) at the University of Toronto. The Internal Review was conducted in September 2016.

The Internal Review Committee consisted of three reviewers. The reviewers were very happy with the curriculum, the administration of the Program, the enthusiastic teachers, engaged/enthusiastic FPA RPC, established CanMEDS-FM roles (well defined) in the Goals/Objectives.

A full report was written and given to the FPA Residency Program. Overall, the reviewers were very happy with the Administration, Structure, Curriculum as well as the evaluation process (CanMEDS-FM format) for the trainees. Numerous strengths were highlighted however a few weaknesses were noted.

The FPA Residency Program made some changes to address the weaknesses identified in the report from the Internal Review. The changes were implemented and the Internal Review Committee was happy with the changes implemented. The DFCM gave the FPA Residency Program full accreditation.

The eLearning and Techonlogical Innovations Program has collaborated with Dr Ahstham Niazi (UME) to create the new content for the UME students.

iBook

The Anesthesia Clerkship Manual iBook was launched to help improve the experience of medical students rotating through anesthesia. This self-study iBook was created from the pre-existing paper based clerkship manual. The iBook features interactivity designed to assist with learning for the medical student rotating through anesthesia.



The new Anesthesia Clerkship Manual features an introduction to anesthesia, key topics and uses illustrations and other key graphical elements to enhance understanding. The iBook incorporates advanced interaction technology that creates study notes and cards as a student highlights text. This iBook brings a new sophistication not previously seen to our undergraduate medical education curriculum and pedagogy. The iBook is available for free.

DIRECTOR, FACULTY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS

Our aim is to plan and implement various program-related initiatives to facilitate the development of our faculty as clinical teachers and educators and impart upon them knowledge and skills to fulfill multiple roles and responsibilities expected of physicians in academic medicine including but not limited to teaching, career planning, leadership and academic promotion.

Faculty Development Day 2015

The annual Faculty Development Day was held on November 11, 2015 at the Chestnut Hotel and Conference Centre in downtown Toronto. This was the first joint meeting with Department of Surgery with nearly 200 faculty staff in attendance. The goals of Faculty Development Day are to showcase



and create opportunities for networking, learning and collaborations around faculty development in the Department of Anesthesia, Department of Surgery, and the University of Toronto system; to provide a platform to present research and innovations in the field of Education or Creative Professional Activities; and to recognize teaching excellence.

Dr. Brian Hodges, Vice President, Education, University Health Network gave the keynote presentation entitled "Transformation: Learners, teachers & 21st century health professional curricula." Dr. Hodges explored the history of models of competence and examined three domains that are likely to require specific attention in the 21st Century. They are: knowledge and its evolution, skills and the ability to perform and identify, and the ability to work in teams.

This was followed by small group workshop sessions on the following topics:

- Clinical supervision in acute care environments. Balancing patient care and teaching. (Dominque Piquette)
- Collegial conflict: Who do I think you are? (Nancy McNaughton)
- Team Communication in the Operating Room: Is there a chill in the air? (Isabella Devito, Anita Sarmah)
- Time Management for the busy physician in the Connected Era: Apps for that! (Guy Petroz)
- Making learning stick: teaching for understanding, retention and application. (Beiseida Mema and A. Kawamura)
- Quality Improvement: increasing communication and cooperation in undertaking quality initiatives in the operating room (Robin McLeod, Stuart McCluskey)
- Effective mentorship (Ori Rotstein and Paul Grieg)
- Teaching technical skills and incorporating an assessment process (Ron Levine and Oleg Safir)
- Negotiations, taxes, incorporation and financial considerations for surgeons and anesthesiologists starting in practice (Barry Rubin)
- Late career transitioning. (Terry Axelrod and George Christakis)

DIRECTOR, CE/CPD PROGRAMS

The Continuing Education Committee for the Department of Anesthesia is comprised of representatives from each of the teaching hospitals as well as directors of CE courses and community hospital representatives. The committee meets four times per year to discuss, plan and organize a number of continuing education initiatives. Among the primary goals of the committee is to ensure that most CE activities qualify for University of Toronto sponsorship and are accredited learning activities.



Course Development

The committee supervises the Toronto Interactive Anesthesia Meeting under the direction of Dr. Adriaan Van Rensburg. This two-day course provides a combination of lectures, workshops and problem-based learning discussions for both fellowship anesthesiologists and GP anesthetists.

Course Sponsorship

The CE Committee aids in the development and accreditation of ongoing CE courses produced by anesthesia faculty at the University of Toronto.

Web-Based Learning:

- 1. CME Online Anesthesia Rounds
 - Developed by Sharon Davies (MSH), this program has been enlarged to include 15 educational modules. These modules have been accredited by the University of Toronto CEPD Department for Section 3 RCPSC credits. In 2014, 987 modules were completed by 451 participants.
